Supervisor Giordano opened the meeting with the Reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Public Comments

Dean Cook expressed his concern about the Solar Law that we went to the Planning Board with a few weeks ago and he is really concerned about this moratorium. He thinks, for the people who weren't here for the Planning Board Session, it was a great session in working through that law, but the first thing the Planning Board decided was that the moratorium was inappropriate to what we are doing in Ticonderoga. He understands where it came from, he understands what the concerns are, which are mainly aesthetics when you get right down to it. There really aren't any other concerns about solar, he doesn't think. There aren't a ton of people out there in the wings waiting to put solar on every house around here, it is not that type of demand at this point, unfortunately. In fact, if anything, the incentives have gone down a little bit in the last couple of months for the use of this and we had a little solar get together about a year ago, Apex solar came up and had an open meeting at the high school and we only had two other people other than he at that meeting, so he doesn't see an "oh, my god - look at these ugly solar panels, they are going to take over the Town", he thinks a moratorium is not only inappropriate in that sense, but he thinks that since the way the law was written and he read it on the website since it was put out it would affect solar plans that are in the works, but not built right now and in that case it would really affect our school system that is trying to put in a solar system to help offset our energy costs and when he found out what it cost to heat that place year after it is actually amazing, \$9,000 a building and that comes out of our tax pockets. If they can put in a solar system up there and offset that for us to at least keep our taxes steady or even decrease them.... we won't have these terrible energy carrying costs that we have now with our buildings and schools, most of them weren't designed to be energy efficient when they were built. So he is totally against and so are most people he thinks were at the Planning Board meeting, he'd say everybody of the moratorium. He thinks we ought to bury that and he thinks we ought to go through with what the Planning Board went through with that meeting and if there are some tweaks to the law, that is fine, but the Planning Board did a great job on working through that law, he thinks, they dealt with aesthetics and set backs and that kind of thing. So if you are going to do something, delete that moratorium.

Minutes for the Ticonderoga Regular Town Board Meeting held on April 19, 2017 commencing at 6:00 p.m. with Public Hearings regarding Weight Limits on Certain Road, Health Insurance for Retirees and a Moratorium on Solar Installations Councilman Taylor asked what led Mr. Cook to believe that we would entertain the moratorium.

Mr. Cook explained that there has been two articles in the paper, and then he went on the web site and read the proposed law and it is right in there about the moratorium that would affect not only planning for six months, it would also affect solar situations that were already in the process.

Councilman Taylor noted that at the last Public Hearing we opted to not go the moratorium and expand on the law.

Mrs. Thompson noted that the public hearing was not closed, so comments and such as still welcome.

Councilman Taylor agreed but we did commission the attorney to come up with a draft law that would address concerns. What was in the paper, wasn't actually what was happening on the ground.

Mr. Cook agreed as he was at the planning board meeting and he thinks it was a pretty nice meeting and it went very well.

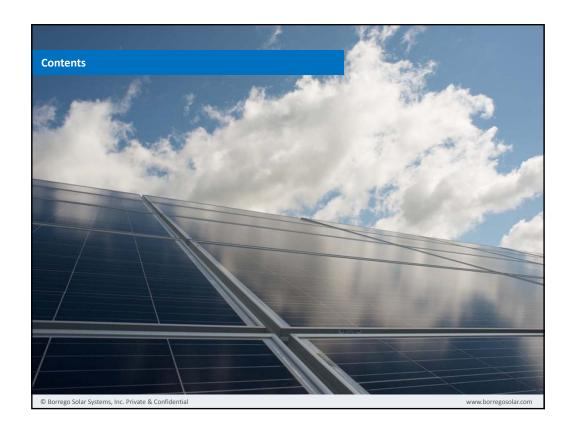
Councilman Taylor agreed.

Presentation

Alex Farkes from Borrego Solar explained that he met with the Supervisor to give an over of the project that he is working on with the Crammond's on Chilson Road and Route 74. It is a large scale project and he would like to make sure that he met with the Town and that you are all understanding what he is looking to do and propose and he thinks it is a pretty valuable proposition to not only land owner but the Town and residents of the Town and the general area that National Grid serves and you all pay your electric bill to.

Mr. Farkes explained the location of the project on the Crammond Property. You want to minimize the amount of trees that you are clearing and this property does that. You want to utilize a property that does not affect any environmentally sensitive areas, wet lands, forestry and this property does that also. They are very feasible locations from a building standpoint, they are also right along high voltage electricity and they are also near the substation on Hague Road. It is a pretty strategic area where we have chosen on the Crammond Property. He has projects that are further South and there is more sunlight down there because of the latitude lines so he can be a little less picky with the sites they chose there, but here, up north there is less electricity that these projects are probably going to produce so he has to be precise as to where he will target land here. This property at Crammond's is a very good location to do a project of this scale just because of it's proximately to the electrical infrastructure that he would need to connect to the project. The following is a power point presentation that the board can review and ask questions if they like.

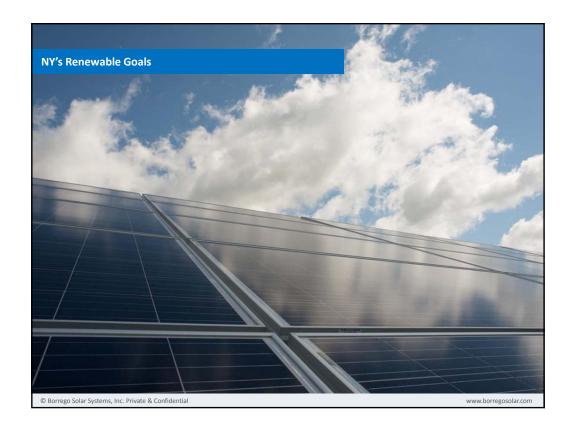


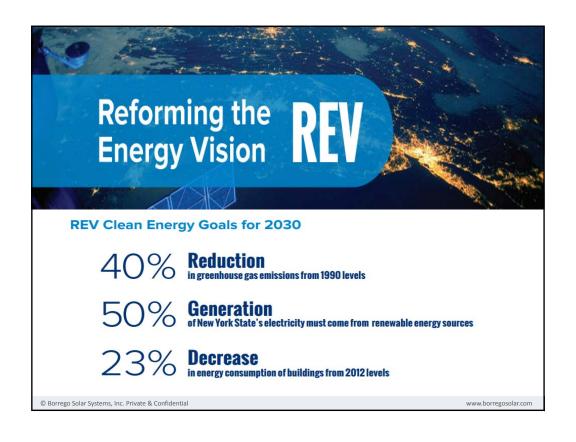

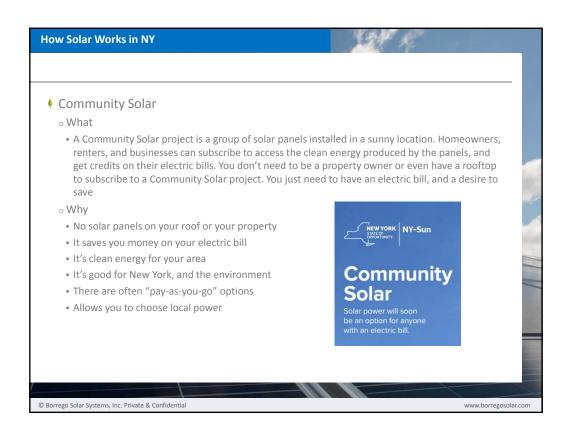


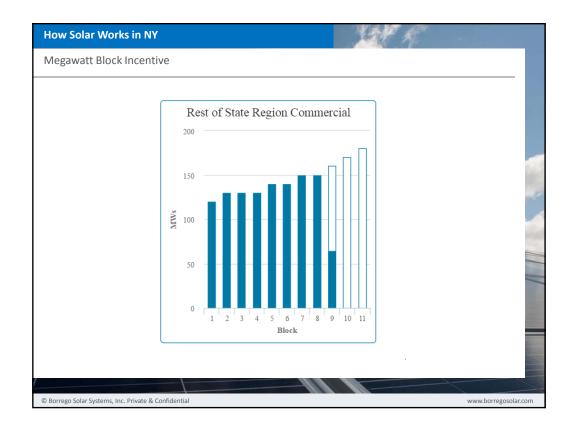




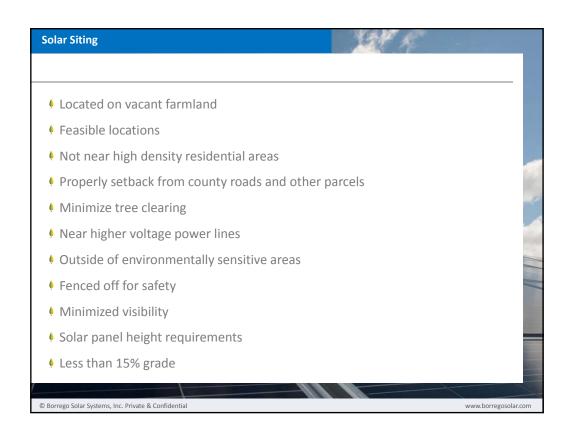




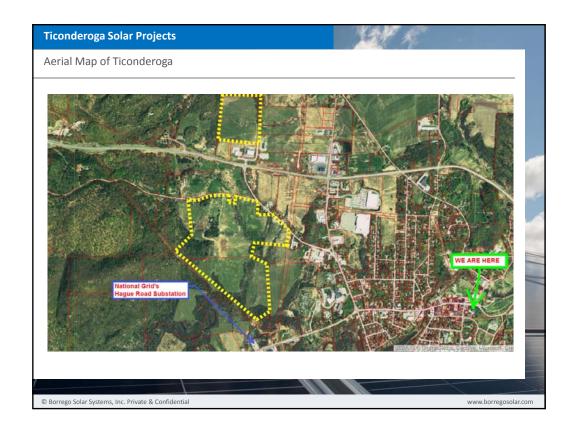




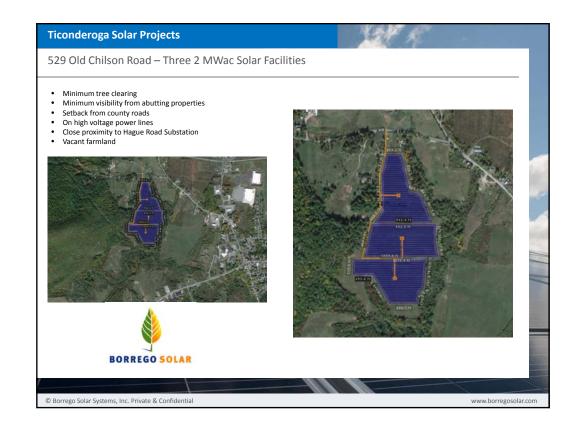
















Opportunity for Ticonderoga

- ♦ RPTL 487 Solar Tax Exemption
- Town has the ability to enter into a Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT)
- Borrego is willing and wants to enter into a PILOT with Ticonderoga in order for their to be incoming revenue for all taxing jurisdictions in the projects' areas (SD and county). We want to maximize project value for <u>all</u> stakeholders.
- If <u>all</u> five projects (10 MWs) are allowed, there is potential for between \$40,000 to \$60,000 in incoming revenue for the taxing jurisdictions (town, SD, county) escalating at 1 to 2% each year about \$4,000 to \$6,000 per MW installed. The range depends on project velocity in order to get highest potential state incentives.
- Above depends on how fast the town is willing to permit projects and National Grid's feasibility studies for the projects. Borrego has already begun these initial studies. In the next ~month Borrego will need to decide to pay approx. \$15,000 to \$20,000 per 2 MW project we are proposing five.
- Incentives are stepping down rapidly in the state yet Borrego has the risk appetite to move forward if projects will be permitted in order projects for all stakeholders
- Town's residents will have the ability to save 10% per month on electricity from the project

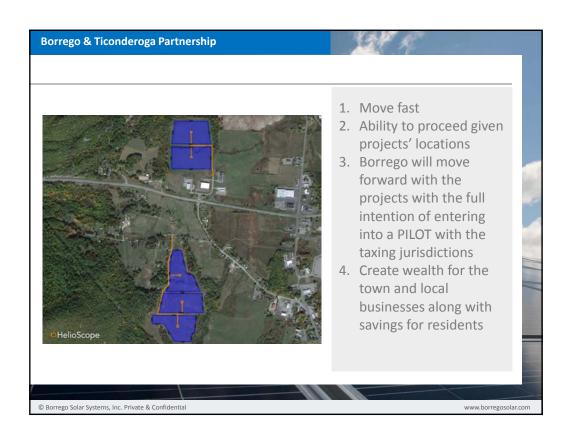
Local Economic Stimulation

- <u>Civil Contractor</u> Installs erosion controls, builds roads, site grading, performs electrical trenching and builds the equipment pads.
- <u>Electrical Contractor</u> Performs the electrical installation and testing of the systems (AC/DC/MediumVoltage Equipment)
- <u>Landscaper</u> Performs hydroseeding, landscape plantings, etc. In some limited cases they also perform tree cutting.
- Fence Contractor Installs security fence and gates.
- Land Clearing In cases of larger areas of tree clearing (3+ acres)
- Other Items to Note

Minutes for the Ticonderoga Regular Town Board Meeting held on April 19, 2017 commencing at 6:00 p.m. with Public Hearings regarding Weight Limits on Certain Road, Health Insurance for Retirees and a Moratorium on Solar Installations Councilman Taylor inquired about the PILOT program, would this be contractual or fixed term?

Mr. Farkes explained that it is normal to have a 10-15 year PILOT program and it would then go away.

Councilman Taylor inquired if this is an allowed use or a land designation change?

Mr. Farkes explained that they have spoken with the APA, there biggest thing is to make sure the Town is on board. He has worked with a lot of different Town's and a lot of different solar laws. If there is a need to change the use to permit it to happen, then we would have to do that.

Mr. Cook asked where are we going to go in 15 - 20 years with these panels, is there a continuation plan here because as you know solar panels last maybe 20 -25 years.

Mr. Farkes agreed that there would be a decommissioning bond, to make sure that those panels would get removed.

Councilman Hunsdon asked how long the panels are guaranteed for?

Mr. Farkes noted that it is on average 20-25 years.

Councilman Hunsdon asked if they would be replaced free of charge?

Mr. Farkes explained that we are not selling the project to the Crammond's, we are owning the project. It would be in his best interest if these panels were to degrade faster than he anticipated..... there has been solar panels for a long time, we understand how much electricity they are going to produce over the period of time. Usually, the effectiveness, the production of each panel drops down about a half a percent each year, so these things will be producing electricity for 30 years. Ultimately, if panels are cheap enough in the year 20, and it is cost effective to replace panels that would be great, but we finance the project on the current equipment that we install from the start.

Mr. Cook added that we can plan on there being big changes in the building and manufacturing of electricity from solar being more efficient, 15 - 20 years you will be looking at panels that will be suitable for everybody. A lot different than what we are looking at now.

Mr. Cook inquired what the APA said.

Mr. Farkes noted that they do not have jurisdiction to permit the project over the Town, so we have to make sure the Town is in approval of the project. There are wetlands around the area, but not where the panels are going to go, so we would bring them in with our wetlands consultants. They are pretty on board with the project, but they didn't give

We are not cutting down trees, we are out of the environmentally sensitive areas.

Councilman Taylor asked in terms of the incentives, this is from State and Federal Government?

Mr. Farkes answered yes, there are Federal incentives and State incentives. The incentives are driving the projects.

Councilman Taylor stated that years ago they had a thing on independent power producers, is there a downside to this?

Mr. Farkes stated no, once studies are started you are eligible for those incentives and you are awarded if your project meets a certain criteria. You get an award letter.

The board thanked Mr. Farkes.

Steve Hunsdon, Chilson Volunteer Fire Company, is here to bring some issues that the Fire Department is having to the Town Board and this is with the water. The last couple of years, we have a spring that feeds the Fire Department as well as the Community Building and, we have been kicking around the thought of drilling a well, we know you guys are having an issue with Gooseneck water system. So our proposal or request from you guys is what could you do to help us get water to our Fire House. What we are looking for is, we have priced out getting a 2" line run, we discussed a 4" line to get enough water so that maybe it can set up a hydrant near the Fire House so we can actually have some fire prevention water there. We have kind of come to an impasse to the point where the water department says that we will probably only get a 2" line and then some other people have also said that we may not even want to hook to the water line because it may not be there in the future. That brings me to a question for you guys, what is going to happen with out water and what are you going to do to help us?

Supervisor Giordano asked if the department was currently getting water from the line?

Mr. Hunsdon stated no, we are currently 1600 feet from the line. We have gotten prices and were actually going to drill a well, between the two getting a well drilled or running a water line we are talking within a \$5,000 difference. If that is the case, why not run a solid line to a main that would sustain water. If we do that, why not lay a big enough line so that we can water for fire prevention closer to the Fire Department or closer to the people on the Putts Pond Road. There is probably almost 100 houses on that road that could benefit. He is talking about maybe a cap stand at the fire house, he is not talking about a public priority.

Councilman Taylor noted that you can form a district.

Supervisor Giordano would like this to be brought to the water/sewer committee to have a conversation. He does not know about the details to this.

Mr. Fuller stated that the existing line, we couldn't right now for legal reasons, hook somebody up to that line. We are under order. We cannot expand our non compliance, but time wise in the next few years there is going to be some decisions that have to be made in terms of water. Next Tuesday is the water and sewer committee meeting and it would be a good time to have that discussion.

Mr. Hunsdon stated that it is the last thing that we want to do is stir up something that is already been.....

Mr. Fuller stated that this has not been resolved and the town has until 2025....

Supervisor Giordano noted that there is a need and we need to address that need...

Mr. Hunsdon stated that as a Fire Chief he is looking for more Fire Prevention water closer to, instead of running those trucks, if we have a fire on the Putts Pond Road we have to shut down 74 every time and every body is running out in the road turning trucks around and it is chaos. To protect the fire men and to protect the people, that is what he is looking for.

Councilman Taylor stated that if it is exclusively for a Fire Protection line....

Mr. Hunsdon stated that we need it more for the department...we need both.

Supervisor Giordano again asked if the department can come to the committee meeting on Tuesday for further discussion with our Water & Sewer Superintendent.

Councilman Taylor stated that we are only talking 1600 feet?

Mr. Hunsdon stated that they got a price to do a 2" line just to feed the department and that was about \$19,000. We are a public entity, why would we have to foot the bill for all of that. Obviously, this would be taking money right out of the taxpayers pockets by doing that. This is why he is bringing this to the board, he is looking for answers and this is one of the things that has been coming up and actually what happened was our well for the community building ran dry the last couple of years so we have been running a hose across the road from the fire house. So it is not right and it needs to be fixed, if we are going to fix it, lets fix it right.

Councilman Taylor asked what would be the consensus of the Chilson residents on forming a Chilson water district?

Mr. Hunsdon stated that the problem with that is that there won't be enough people on the water line. You have more people off the water line, than on the water line. If you had to vote on that, it wouldn't go. You would have to involve the rest of the town, you would have to get a bigger district.

Councilman Taylor stated that there could be a survey of the geography to form a district, if you provided us with a petition of people that want to become a district, we would be obliged to provide you water.

Mike Trybendis asked if you would include the people down the hill, they would need to be in the district, not just 100 people in Chilson to be fair.

Councilman Taylor stated that there are 125 customers from the reservoir up to Eagle Lake that can be in that district.

Supervisor Giordano again asked to have this discussion at the water and sewer committee meeting, bring a summary of what you are asking.

Public Hearings

Weight Limits on Certain Highways

Supervisor Giordano explained that this have been continued from the beginning of the year and we have had recent conversations to set up meetings with IP and Lyme Timber for more discussion. At this time, he would like to close the public hearing until we get new information.

Ticonderoga Police Department Report

VACANT POSITION

Chief Johns and the Police Commissioners had a meeting today to discuss the vacant positions within the department. They are planning to hire one full time officer and one part time officer. At this time there is only one candidate that has applied who is already trained, they will look at this individual first and then move to individuals who will need training.

DRUG RAID AT 63 LORD HOWE

Chief Johns congratulated his staff for the hard work they put in to complete the Lord Howe Drug Raid. This was a long investigation. 9 individuals were arrested out of that home on March 18, 2017. Everyone arrested that night is currently still in jail and one individual has already pled guilty to her charges and will be spending 9mo. In jail (her charges were non-drug related).

Chief Johns would like this committee to make a recommendation to the Town Board to use the Nuisance Law against 63 Lord Howe Street and have the Certificate of Occupancy removed for at least one year. Chief Johns plans to meet with the Town Attorney tomorrow and discuss the points that can be accumulated against that property. Once that is completed a Public Hearing would need to be set.

Commissioner Margaret Lauman asked Chief Johns about the Local Law's specific wording. He responded that he will meet with the Town Attorney to work out the details. Ross Kelley mentioned again that it seems to take a very long time to complete things in this town and why the town allows these things to go on. Dave Woods explained that he has the same situation on Burgoyne Road with the drugs.

Dave Woods asked Chief Johns about the K9 searches. Ross Kelley feels that he does not hear about the effectiveness of the K9. Chief Johns explained the circumstances that have to take place for the K9 to search a vehicle.

Commissioner Lauman asked about the statistics not showing any felonies. Chief Johns explained how the arrest statistics work when the Drug Task Force is involved in an investigation. During the Lord Howe Street Drug Raid there were Felony Charges for some of the individuals.

Councilman Hunsdon reviewed the minutes from last month.

Codes Department

They have been working on shutting down apartment buildings.

Danielle Holman wrote a codes violation for Shauna Moran at 63 Lord Howe Street prior to her getting arrested. The paperwork is still sitting on her desk. Chief Johns stated that they can have the paperwork served to her in jail, eventually they will need to serve the paperwork for the Nuisance Property.

Councilman Hunsdon asked about what happen with the property on the Lower Road. They took it to court a couple months ago but haven't heard back about the decision. Councilman Wayne Taylor wanted to let everyone know that there will be a notification going out on the Everbridge System about the new law for Solar Panels. There will be a public hearing on April 13, 2017 @ 6pm in the Community Building.

There was a discussion on the "abandon properties" and what the definition of "abandon properties" actually is.

There was a discussion on what the status of 170/172 Champlain Ave was. Issues to Remedy were sent out, one was signed for and one was not. Danielle Holman was planning on issuing tickets this week but she needs to meet with the Town Attorney first to discuss options.

Ti Fire Department

A skid tank was ordered and will hopefully be here by the end of the month. This was a joint piece of equipment purchased with Ti EMS.

Councilman Wayne Taylor thanked Ti Fire for putting the Everbridge information on their board.

Other Information

Commissioner Lauman asked about using Everbridge for when it had been declared a State of Emergency during the storm, she would like to see a notification sent out about those things. Councilman Taylor responded that they are working out all the kinks and agreed that we should probably send out a notification for things like that. He stated that Tonya Thompson has been getting some feedback about the system and they are going to sit down and discuss how to use the notification system most efficiently.

- The minutes of the 03/02/17 Highway Meeting were accepted as presented.
- Joyce Cooper spoke to follow up on some issues raised at the BGPR Committee meeting; specifically requesting that some additional public parking signs be installed at the former Sears building area downtown.
- John Deming cautioned the committee that this area in particular is encumbered by many preexisting easements and rights of way. John agreed to accompany Joyce Cooper and to install some paint marking delineating the approximate areas subject to the easements.
- Mitch asked who owned the former State Theatre property.
- Sal asked about the status of the finances pertaining to the BAN to use for the new highway trucks. Joe G responded the financing will be in place after the April TB Mtg, the attorney needing some numbers to finish the paper work.
- John Deming reported the town still has some unfulfilled obligations with ARC to construct some off street parking for Cannon Ball Path, it will require the installation of fabric and gravel to complete.
- Sal reported that the trucks currently out to bid can't awarded, 2- 550's and Western Star Tandem due the lack of purchasing documents, see above.
- The committee discussed BAN's versus leasing, Joe G will schedule a workshop to iron it out.
- John Deming inquired about the status of the proposed conveyance of the undeveloped town access road to Lot 3 at the Ticonderoga Commerce Park to the Essex Co. IDA. He will get with the town clerk to see what is stalling this.
- Joyce Cooper speaking on behalf of the TMSP mentioned that the town will be receiving a grant to fix up in front of the Sugar n Spice Shop located at 98 Montcalm St. The grant will provide for the installation of 2 new light fixtures and the planting of two salt resistant crabapple trees. She went to add that these fixtures will be the same as those on Tower Ave. Tony Defranco will be doing the paver and tree installations. Brian Merfeld will be installing the lighting fixtures.
- Wayne asked if snow removal was considered in the design of these improvements and was told that had not been considered.
- Sal asked if the falling crabapples on the sidewalk would pose any safety issues.
- John Deming added that the town of Elizabethtown had added a salt resistant crabapple tree along the golf courses border with US RT 9 and that they had held up well.
- Mitch notified the committee that all town roads had been given a temporary 6 ton weight limit due the frost coming out of the ground making them more susceptible to damage. This posting will remain until things dry up.

- Mitch notified the committee that he and Sal had met with the Beautification Crewmen, Dick Bessett and Eugene Alteri to formulate plans for the year.
- Joe Giordano mentioned a new asset management plan to include any major road reconstruction. He said that Derrick and Sal will coordinate this effort.
- Joe mentioned that he thinks that Shumaker Engineering had a spoils permit from the DEC to allow for filling at the Ti Airport. Joe will find out if this permit is still valid for use by town personnel.
- Joe said that he has been working on a GIS template for the grounds crew. It shows all of the areas currently under the care of the town.

Two of the electrical box covers are broken and need to be replaced.

Ernie said that we now have 11 based planes on the FAA web site for 4B6. Gliders will count toward our based aircraft and three will be added to the web site. Jim Cummings said that the FAA should update our status this year and will let us know as soon as he has any new information.

Ernie will check with the FAA about the status of our night approach. Next meeting will be at 0830 on Wednesday, 3 May, at the town hall.

Pledge

Supervisor Giordano opened the meeting with the Reciting of the Pledge of Allegiance.

Items for discussion:

- 1. Schedule Workshops
 - a. Supervisor Giordano stated that the Committee needs to set a date to discuss the Sewer Use Ordinance and other policies.
 - i. Supervisor Giordano will confirm details at a later date.

2. Hague Road Pump Station

- a. As a follow-up from the February 28 Water and Sewer Committee Meeting, Derrick addressed the Committee in regard to the need for repairs to the Hague Road Pump Station.
 - i. Derrick stated that one of the pump rails broke, and is unsafe to replace without the proper equipment. Also, a stand by generator (permanent generator) is needed in that location. He would like to create a project for that area, and have a contractor do the work.
 - ii. Greg stated that he will look over the pump station, and asked if the Town would like AES to do the design work and pre-planning for any immediate fixes. The Town could possibly apply for an engineering planning grant for a more in depth study at a later date.
 - iii. Supervisor Giordano commented that the first step will be to scope the project and costs associated with the repairs so that a funding source can then be pursued.

1. The Committee recommends to the Town Board to adopt a resolution authorizing AES to do a preliminary study on the reconstruction of the Hague Road Pump Station.

3. Lake George Steamboat Company

- a. Mr. Dow had sent a draft agreement to the Town in regard to the encroachment upon the lands of the Steamboat Company, and is awaiting a response.
 - i. Supervisor Giordano stated that the Town needs to decide on what the long term plan will be for the filter plant before responding.
 - 1. A map of the property was reviewed by the Committee.
 - ii. After much discussion, Matt will follow up with Mr. Dow with a timeframe that the Town would plan to remove its encroachment on the Steamboat Company's property.
- 4. MJ Engineering LCBP (Lake Champlain Basin Program) Asset Management Plan
 - a. Tracy commented that following a meeting with MJ Engineering at the WWTP, they have been busy with scanning equipment files to create a maintenance plan for the Town.
 - i. After MJ Engineering creates the maintenance plan for the WWTP equipment, they will be giving the Town software that will assist with tracking the maintenance schedules for all the equipment.
 - ii. Greg asked if the Town had heard back from DEC on their Asset Management Plan.
 - 1. Tracy stated that the Town had previously been notified that it was a finalist, but never heard back on what decision was made.

5. Sewer Pollution Right To Know Grant

- a. Todd addressed the Committee in regard to the grant, and asked what the Town hopes to gain from it.
 - i. After a brief discussion, it was decided that Todd, Derrick and Tracy will meet to discuss the grant further, and what is needed to satisfy the grant requirements.
- 6. Coordination of water/sewer projects with highway projects
 - a. Supervisor Giordano asked that Derrick and/or Tracy attend Highway Meetings, and that Sal attend Water/Sewer Committee Meetings when there are projects expected that will effect either department.

- 7. HydroSource Associates Proposal Master Water Project
 - a. The Town received a proposal from HydroSource Associates for Hydrogeologic Scope of Services for Groundwater Source Location and Development.
 - i. Greg, Rob and Todd have reviewed the proposal. Matt will send Greg his comments.
 - 1. The Town Board will need to review and approve the HydroSource proposal before moving forward. AES will also get a proposal from Layne Christensen for test wells to be conducted along with HydroSource's hydrogeological activities, which will also need to be approved by the Town Board.

Water and Wastewater Superintendent Report - Derrick Fleury

- 1. Woody Lane
 - a. As a follow up from the February 28, 2017 Water and Sewer Committee Meeting, Derrick stated that there two properties on Woody Lane where the sewer main needs to be replaced.
 - Derrick sent the names and addresses for the parcels involved to Matt.
 - 1. Matt will address the properties soon.
- 2. Maintenance on the boiler at the WWTP
 - a. Derrick reported that the boiler at the WWTP is scheduled for maintenance. Stants Combustion does the maintenance on the boiler, and the cost was budgeted for.
 - i. The Committee approved the expense as it was placed in the budget.

Chief Plant Operator Report - Tracy Smith

- 1. Pre-bid meeting for the WQIP project
 - a. Tracy commented that there was a good turnout for the pre-bid meeting, and asked Greg what the estimated cost will be for the project.
 - i. Greg commented that it's estimated between 4.8 5.3 million (conservative)
